# 아산정책硏, 한국 최초 아시아의 목소리를 실은 외교안보 전문 영문 웹저널 'The Asan Forum' 19 일 창간

- 아산정책연구원(원장 함재봉)은 19 일(금) 한국 최초로 외교안보정책 전문 영문 웹저널 'The Asan Forum(아산포럼, www.theasanforum.org)'을 창간한다.
- 함 원장은 "우선 '학술'을 바탕으로 한 '정책저널' 컨텐츠 생산에 대한 시대적인 요구가 잇따르고 있고, 인쇄본 형식의 한계를 지닌 기존 저널들과의 차별성을 고민하던 중 한단계 진보한 e 저널 형식을 채택하였습니다. 또한 내용상으로는 아시아 이슈를 아시아 출신 전문가들의 시각과 목소리로 전 세계에 소개함으로서 상대적으로 서구, 특히 미국 중심이었던 외교안보 분야에서 아시아 목소리를 내는 방향으로 구성을 잡았고, 필진간에 이런 방식과 컨텐츠에 대한 합의가 이루어져 이번에 창간하게 되었습니다."라고 창간 계기를 설명한다.
- 편집위원장은 아시아에 대한 이해뿐 아니라 아시아의 목소리를 중시하는 동아시아지역 분야의 석학인 길 로즈만 전 프린스턴대 교수가 맡았다.
- 편집위원으로는 최강 아산정책연구원 부원장, 이숙종 성균관대 교수, 빅토르 차 조지타운대 교수, 토마스 크리스텐슨 프린스턴대 교수, 게리 세이모어 전 미국 백안관 국가안보회의(NSC) 대량파괴무기(WMD) 조정관, 요시히데 소에야 일본 게이오대 교수, 츄수롱 중국 칭화대 교수, 왕지스 중국 베이징대 국제관계학원장 등 한·중·일·미·러 외 동남아 지역 25 명이 참여한다.
- 창간호에는 길 로즈만 교수외에 최 강 아산정책연구원 부원장, 왕지스 교수, 마이클 그린 미 싱크탱크 전략국제문제연구소 일본실장 등 외교안보 분야 저명한 전문가들의 논문이 실린다. 또한 함재봉 원장이 초국적, 초지역적 이슈를 다루는 '아산포럼'의 발간 의미를 되짚고 이를 축하하는 서문을 쓴다.
- 국내외 외교안보 이슈에 관심이 있는 모든 이(concerned citizen)를 위한 저널을 표방하는 '아산포럼'은 2개월마다 발간된다.

아산정책연구원 (원장 함재봉, www.asaninst.org)은 객관적이면서 수준 높은 공공정책 연구를 수행하는 독립적인 연구기관입니다. 한반도, 동아시아, 그리고 지구촌의 현안에 대한 깊이 있는 정책 대안을 제시하고, 국민과 정책결정자들이 합리적이고 공공의 복리를 극대화시킬 수 있는 정책을 선택하도록 돕는 싱크탱크의 역할을 지향합니다. 2008 년 설립 이후 국내외 학술교류, 아산플래넘, 아산핵포럼과 같은 대규모 국제회의 개최, 《China's Foreign Policy》, 《Japan in Crisis》, 《출구가 없다》, 《14 호 수용소 탈출》 연구 서적 출간 등의 활발한 연구활동을 하고 있으며, 2012 년 펜실베니아대 주관의 세계싱크탱크 랭킹 지역부문에서는 5 위를 차지하였습니다.

# ■편집위원장 <길 로즈만 Gilbert Rozman>



Affiliation : Musgrave Professor of Sociology at Princeton University

Gilbert Rozman, Senior Fellow, is Musgrave Professor of Sociology at Princeton University. He explores national identities in China, Japan, Russia, and South Korea, to understand how they shape bilateral trust and evolving relations in the region. His books include a series of four: Japanese Strategic Thought toward Asia, Russian Strategic Thought toward Asia, South Korean Strategic Thought toward Asia, and Strategic Thinking about the Korean Nuclear Crisis: Four Parties Caught between North Korea and the United States (co-ed. except the last a monograph, Palgrave, 2006–2008). He wrote Northeast Asia's Stunted Regionalism: Bilateral Distrust in the Shadow of Globalization (Cambridge University Press, 2004). He is a member of the editorial boards of China Quarterly, Asian Survey, and the Journal of East Asian Studies.

Korea Chair, Center for Strategic and International Studies



Dr. Cha is senior adviser and Korea Chair at the Center for Strategic and International Studies. He is also director of Asian Studies and holds the D.S. Song-KF Chair at Georgetown University. From 2004 to 2007, he served as director for Asian affairs at the White House on the National Security Council (NSC). Dr. Cha was also the deputy head of delegation for the United States at the Six-Party Talks in Beijing. He is the award-winning author of *Alignment Despite Antagonism: The United States-Korea-Japan Security Triangle*, winner of the 2000 Ohira Book Prize; *Nuclear North Korea: A Debate on Engagement Strategies*, with David Kang; *Beyond the Final Score: The Politics of Sport in Asia*; and *The Impossible State: North Korea, Past and Future*, selected by Foreign Affairs magazine as a 2012 "Best Book on Asia and the Pacific." Dr. Cha is a former John M. Olin National Security Fellow at Harvard University, a two-time Fulbright Scholar, and a Hoover National Fellow, CISAC Fellow, and William J. Perry Fellow at Stanford University. Dr. Cha holds a B.A., an M.I.A., and a Ph.D. from Columbia University, as well as an M.A. from Oxford University.

# < 토마스 크리스텐슨 Thomas J. Christensen >

프린스턴대 교수



Thomas J. Christensen is a nonresident senior fellow with the John L. Thornton China Center in the Foreign Policy program at Brookings. He is a professor of politics and international affairs and co-director of the Princeton-Harvard China and the World program at Princeton University. From 2006-2008 he served as deputy assistant secretary of state for East Asian and Pacific affairs with responsibility for relations with China, Taiwan and Mongolia.

His research and teaching focuses on China's foreign relations, the international relations of East Asia and international security. Before arriving at Princeton in 2003, he taught at Cornell University and MIT. He received his B.A. from Haverford College, his M.A. in International Relations from the University of Pennsylvania, and a Ph.D. in Political Science from Columbia University.

Professor Christensen has served on the board of directors and the executive committee of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations and as co-editor of the International History and Politics series at Princeton University Press. He is a life member of the Council on Foreign Relations. In 2002 he was presented with a Distinguished Public Service Award by the United States Department of State.

# < **왕지스** 王緝思 Wang Jisi >

베이징(北京)대 국제관계학원장



Wang Jisi is dean of the School of International Studies, Peking University, and director of the Center for International and Strategic Studies, Peking University. He has been a member of the Foreign Policy Advisory Committee of the Foreign Ministry of China since October 2008, and president of the Chinese Association for American Studies since 2001.

After working as a laborer in the Chinese countryside in 1968-78, Wang Jisi entered Peking University and obtained an MA degree there in 1983. He was a visiting fellow or visiting professor at Oxford University (1982-83), University of California at Berkeley (1984-85), University of Michigan at Ann Arbor (1990-91), and Claremont McKenna College in California (2001). He taught in Peking University's Department of International Politics (1983-91), and then served as director of the Institute of American Studies at the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences until 2005 when he assumed the current position at Peking University. He was concurrently director of the Institute of International Strategic Studies at the Central Party School of the Communist Party of China from 2001 to 2009. He advises a few U.S. foreign policy think tanks, and is on the editorial boards of *The American Interest, Global Asia,* and many Chinese scholarly journals. Professor Wang's scholarly interests cover U.S. foreign policy, Chinese foreign policy, and Asian security. He has published numerous works in these fields.

# < 윌리엄 오버홀트 William H. Overholt >

Senior Research Fellow, Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University



Dr. Overholt is senior research fellow at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government. Previously he was the director of the Center for Asia Pacific Policy at RAND. For 21 years he headed investment bank research teams, serving as managing director and head of research at Bankers Trust in Hong Kong, managing director of research for BankBoston's regional headquarters in Singapore, and head of Asia Strategy and Economics for Nomura in Hong Kong. He also spent eight years at the Hudson Institute, where he managed research projects for the Department of Defense, National Security Council, NASA, and others, and was director of a business consulting subsidiary. Dr. Overholt is the author of six books, most notably *Asia, America and the Transformation of Geopolitics;* and *The Rise of China*, along with books on risk analysis and strategic planning. He received his B.A. from Harvard and his M.Phil. and Ph.D. from Yale.

# < 게리 세이모어 Gary Samore >

Executive Director for Research, Belfer Center for Science and Int'l Affairs Member of the Board, Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs



As of February 2013, Dr. Gary Samore is the Executive Director for Research at the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. Prior to that, he served for four years as President Obama's White House Coordinator for Arms Control and the Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD) Terrorism, including as U.S. Sherpa for the 2010 Nuclear Security Summit in Washington, DC and the 2012 Nuclear Security Summit in Seoul, Korea. As WMD Coordinator, he served as the principal advisor to the President on all matters relating to arms control and the prevention of weapons of mass destruction proliferation and WMD terrorism, and coordinated United States government activities, initiatives, and programs to prevent proliferation and WMD terrorism and promote international arms control efforts.

Dr. Samore was Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for Nonproliferation and Export controls during the Clinton Administration. He was responsible for formulating and coordinating U.S. policy to prevent the proliferation of nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons, and missile delivery systems. Before the National Security Council, Dr. Samore worked on nonproliferation issues at the Department of State. In 1995, he received the Secretary of Defense Medal for Meritorious Civilian Service for his role in negotiating the 1994 North Korea nuclear agreement. Prior to the State Department, he worked at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory and the Rand Corporation.
